President's Message from Owen Moe

IN PRAISE OF TREES

In 1793 Thomas Jefferson wrote, "I never before knew the full value of trees - under them I breakfast, dine, write, read, and receive my company. What would I not give that the trees planted nearest the house at Monticello were full grown." Teddy Roosevelt, an avid advocate for trees, said "A people without children would face a hopeless future; a country without trees is almost as hopeless." (from "What's a Tree Worth?" by Jill Jonnes, Winter 2011 *Wilson Quarterly* of the Woodrow Wilson International Center For Scholars.)

What is it about trees that causes even presidents to praise them? An online presentation by the National Forest Service entitled *Trees in Our City* lays out the many benefits of trees within towns and cities (http://www.fs.fed.us/psw/programs/uesd/uep/TreesInOurCity/Trees_in_Our_City_Northeast.pdf).

Whether we are aware of it or not, trees are an integral part of the infrastructure of any town, and they can enhance both a town and the quality of life within that town. According to *Trees in our City*:

- Trees are vital to community health in that tree-filled neighborhoods are safer and more sociable and they reduce stress.
- Trees actively purify the air, reducing airborne pollutants and producing oxygen. They also trap and retain rainwater, reducing runoff.
- Trees cool in the summer, providing pleasant shaded areas and significantly reducing air conditioning costs.
- Trees make homes more attractive and mature specimen trees can increase property values by 10%.
- Trees stimulate local small businesses: in tree-lined town centers, people visit more frequently, shop longer, and spend more money.
- Cost are associated with maintaining trees to be sure, but a study in Modesto, CA shows that for each \$1 invested in trees, \$1.89 in benefits is returned to residents through increased property values, removal of air pollutants, reduction of storm water runoff, and energy savings through shade.



Finally, of course, there are the intangibles – the aesthetic beauty of a tree-lined street (see the picture above which shows East Main Street in Annville in the late 1800's – from the *Pictorial History of Annville*), cool sidewalks on a hot summer day, the presence of songbirds, and the brilliant colors in the fall. We are fortunate in Annville that the downtown streetscape project of 2002-03 included the planting of trees along Main Street. And as we move into another hot Annville summer, we may wish along with Thomas Jefferson that the trees in the town center were already full grown. ■

FOOA Electronic Archive Unveiled at Spring Meeting

Paul Fullmer, creator of FOOA's new *Electronic Archive of Annville History*, gave an overview of the new archive for the 65 persons who attended the FOOA Spring Meeting at the Lebanon Valley Home on April 21. Fullmer used computer projection to demonstrate the archive, which is organized according to street addresses.



The archive contains historic and more modern images of the properties and families, historical documents, news articles, and extensive historical notes researched by Doris Flory.

Annville resident Betty Streicher shared over 1,000 images from a collection of pictures and postcards begun by her husband, the late Dick Streicher, in the 1960s. Pictures from Ammon Balaster, Scott Saylor, Linnea Miller, Robert Long and several other local families, as well as reports to the Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission and pictures and documents previously donated to the FOOA

archives, also contributed substantially to the archive.

After Fullmer demonstrated the archive, he spent about one hour looking up information on specific properties as requested by many members of the audience. The picture above shows Paul Fullmer (on right) discussing the archive after his presentation. Friends of Old Annville is now considering ways to make the archive available to persons doing historical research on their homes or on Annville itself.

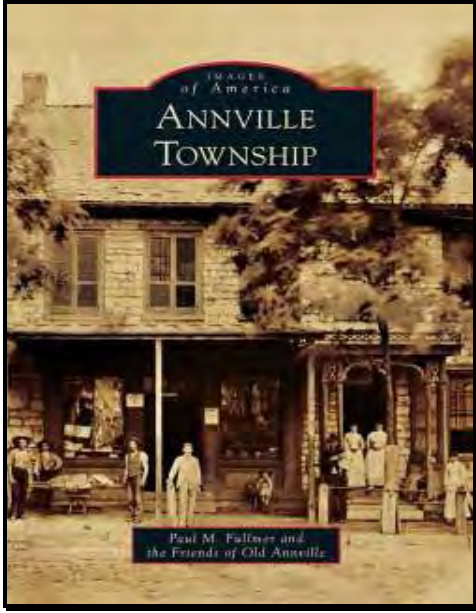
Old Fink's Bakery Open on Old Annville Day

The former Fink's Bakery will be open to the public from 9 a.m.- 1 p.m. as part of the June 11 Old Annville Day celebration. Friends of Old Annville and the Annville Economic Development Authority are cooperating to make available a portion of the old bakery to the visiting public as well as to showcase Annville's downtown development project.

The award of a \$1,000,000 Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Redevelopment Assistance Grant in June 2006 rekindled interest in the reuse of the bakery property. Now the bakery is an important part of the downtown Annville economic development project extending from the 25 East Main Street bakery property west to North White Oak Street (PA Route 934). Plans include a landscaped park on the corner of Main and White Oak Streets, an approximately 40-space, off-street parking lot, and landscaped pedestrian walkways.

In addition to an opportunity to see portions of the interior of the old bakery, the Old Annville Day "open house" will offer architectural views of the entire downtown economic development project. Members of the AEDA and FOOA will be on hand to discuss the project and the interior of the bakery. Entrance to the building will be from Lebanon Street.

NEW PICTURE HISTORY OF ANNVILLE



On June 10 Arcadia Publishing will release a pictorial history entitled *Annville Township* as part of its “Images of America” series.

The Friends of Old Annville have partnered with Paul Fullmer to create a block-by-block pictorial history that incorporates information from walking tours spanning several decades. A part of the proceeds from the sale of each book benefits the Friends.

More than 225 historic pictures taken at locations along Main, Queen, Maple and other streets as well as at Lebanon Valley College fill 128 pages. Street addresses provided in the captions allow the reader to engage the dynamics of history by comparing the past with the present.

Images from the archives of the Friends of Old Annville as well as from local residents and community groups serve as powerful testimonies to entire communities of ages past and the contributions they have made to the present. Most of the pictures have never been published before.

200 copies of the book will be available for sale on **Historic Old Annville Day** in front of the Coptic Church at 118 W. Main Street from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. on **Saturday, June 11**. Each copy will sell for \$20.00 (tax included in price). Paul Fullmer will be available to sign the book. *NOTE: Although copies may be ordered through online booksellers for \$21.95 + shipping, orders placed through FOOA significantly benefit the organization.*
