Become Involved in the Work of FOOA

President's Message by Owen Moe

If you are a member of Friends of Old Annville, you recently received a mailing that included raffle tickets and our glossy FOOA brochure. We include the brochure to remind all of us of what our organization does. It is good periodically to reflect on our fundamental purpose, our raison d'etre if you will. And in this message I would like to do just that. Below I summarize and assess the two most fundamental purposes of Friends of Old Annville.

Historic Preservation. FOOA from its origin and at its heart is an organization committed to the preservation of historic resources in Annville. We value Annville's unique historic character, its sense of place that connects to us to the past. Our efforts in this arena have been through (1) our Façade Grant Program, (2) FOOA's own restoration of the Annville Train Station, (3) our awarding of our annual Historic Building and Property Pride Awards, and (4) our support of our Annville local government in its attempts to restore the town center.

What can we do better? In my opinion, we need to better advertise and better fund our Façade Grants Program and more often utilize the Historic Train Station for events and programming. We could also do more to provide to the public information on restoration, its techniques, and sources of funding – perhaps setting up a restoration kiosk at the train station or offering periodic "how-to" programs on restoration.

Annville History. Understanding Annville's history goes hand-in-hand with historic preservation – it provides the underpinning for our preservation efforts. Our major project in this area has been the development of our *Electronic Archive*

of Annville History, a growing digital collection of historic photographs, documents, histories, and other memorabilia related to Annville. The archive is a resource to historians, to property owners who want to research their homes, and to families tracing their roots. We use our relatively-new Facebook page to feature photographs from the archives, drawing an encouraging response from both current and former Annvillians all over the country. We have also digitized several short histories of Annville that are accessible on our website (www.fooa.org).

What can we do better? We could certainly use someone willing to engage in a fresh attempt at compiling our collection of earlier histories (the histories sometimes disagree with each other) and writing a more definitive, research-based history of Annville. Also, as the electronic archive grows, we need to find better ways to find new donors of memorabilia, to scan and electronically file items, and to more easily share our collection with our members, perhaps through our planned new design of the FOOA website. Finally, there is plenty of room to expand our number of FOOA programs related to Annville history - I'm sure that there are many people out there with expertise or with stories to tell and we just need to find them and enlist them to present programs.

Looking to become involved? Both of these areas of work within FOOA provide real opportunities for volunteer assistance. HISTORY OF THE UNION CANAL PRESENTED AT 2014 FOOA SPRING PROGRAM


On Sunday afternoon, on May 4, a group of 35 people gathered at the Historic Annville Train Station to hear Jim Schucker present an excellent slide program on the history of the Union Canal in Lebanon County.

Schucker, a member of the Friends of the Union Canal Tunnel Park and an avid canal historian, laid out the history of the building and funding of the canal and showed both current and historic images of many of the canal locks in Lebanon County.

Shucker also covered the current project of restoring the canal boats that are used for tours at the tunnel park. Audience questions resulted in a long and lively discussion followed, of course by cider, cookies, and conversation.

Another Finger Gone. Just as we were putting the last pipe in place, my finger got caught between the two pieces and the end of it popped off ... same hand as the other two lost fingers. The contractor working with us asked us if we knew where the hospital was. Jack said, "Yes, we've been there before." So they had to call the doctor off the golf course so he could sew it back on. He wasn't happy about that. When he was finished, he said, "I thought I did a pretty good job, but why did you want me to sew it back on? It would have matched the other two." I said, "If you would have left it off, I couldn't wave to anybody. It would look like I'm giving the finger to them because the middle finger was the only one left."

Now available via Google Drive at Annville/Collections Donated along with more than 24,000 electronic files.

Brenda Huff joins a team of Friends of Old Annville volunteers in advancing our Electronic Archives. Brenda comes to us via the Senior Employment Assistance Program of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP). Now that she has received basic training on the use scanner and camera for a variety of artifacts, Brenda is incorporating hundreds of documents into the archives each week. Future training will include stitch-assist scanning, PDF editing and consolidation, and posting to social media, among other useful skills. Welcome, Brenda!

The Friends appreciate receiving several donations over the past two months. Many of the following items are now available via the Electronic Archives.



Dean Snyder Jr. and Dean Snyder Sr. share more than 2 hours' worth of color footage from the Millard cattle ranch, quarry, mill and other operations taken in the mid-1950s. Keep an eye out for a future program by the Friends at which we will have an opportunity to enjoy a screening.

A set of graded college essays written by LVC student Kathryn Nisley in the mid-1920s has been shared with us by **Lois Herr**. The reading is quite enjoyable (and the grades are good)!

Harry Fake has shared a set of three picturesque poems about Annville happenings written mid-century by Rev. William Shaud (AHS '42). And there are more to come....

A set of handwritten land surveys dated June 10, 1819 and related to a **Long Family of Annville** have been discovered in the notes of **Doris Flory**. They will soon be passed along to the Lebanon County Historical Society for professional-quality preservation.

Mary Ruth Pearce has donated full hard-copy editions of the 1972 Lebanon Daily News Centennial Edition (all 288 pages!) and the 1976 Bicentennial Edition.

Much discussion has transpired lately regarding the residents of the first block of East Sheridan Avenue before many of the homes there were destroyed.
